A brush with Hurricane Wilma for our Islands was a little scary for many of us this past week. We thank God we were not in line with its path this time. Hopefully this last month of the season will not be like the first month in June when we had two hurricanes pass us by.

Today we celebrate **WORLD MISSION SUNDAY**. With Catholics of the world we are called to this Eucharistic celebration to offer our prayers and our generous financial support, through the Propagation of the Faith, to continue the mission of our Lord. By our prayers and by what we offer through the Propagation of the Faith, we support mission priests, Religious sisters and brothers, and lay catechists as they proclaim the Gospel to the poorest of our human family, helping them come to know the great love of Jesus.

At St. Paul's Major Seminary in Khartoum, Sudan, 29 students are preparing for a lifetime of service as priests. Most are orphans due to the ongoing war in their African homeland. Others have not seen their families in more than 15 years. Says Rector Father John Dingi: "A good number have witnessed tragic events of violence and killings. They feel lonely—like exiles in their own country." And yet, these young men feel that their faith in Jesus Christ can make a real difference for the suffering in their country. Seminarian James Pitza states: "My plan is to educate people to know more about the Gospel—to encourage justice and peace, and to persuade others to develop their cultural values in spreading the Gospel of Christ."

Sisters in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, found children abandoned and alone on the streets. Moved to action, they took over a rundown building and turned it into a safe haven—a real home—for these little ones. "These children need protective arms—and lots of love," says Sister Luitgarda. Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Ex 22:20-26/ 1 Thes 1:5c-10/ Mt 22:34-40

Perhaps it would be well to say something about all these traps the Pharisees are setting for Jesus. The rabbis like nothing better than to engage in heated discussions about minute points of the law. Certainly there is something sinister about these word games initiated by the Pharisees, but the debates would have been enjoyed by both Jesus and his listeners.

In today's gospel the Pharisees ask Jesus about the greatest commandment. This was a much debated question among the rabbis. There are 613 commandments; 248 positive, or "thou shalt's," and 365 prohibitions, or "thou shalt not's." The commandments were distinguished as "light" and "heavy," much as we Catholics distinguish between venial and mortal sins. The distinction has to do with seriousness, or weight, of the matter.

To answer their question, Jesus quotes two passages from the Pentateuch—the first five books of the Old Testament. "You shall love the Lord your God..." is the Deuteronomy 6:5 and "you shall love your neighbor as yourself" is from Leviticus 19:18. What is different about his answer is that nowhere else are these two commandments given equal weight. Jesus is announcing a new idea of the kingdom, where love of each other is a measure and sign of our love for God.

Today's first reading emphasizes the importance of just treatment of the poorest ones, for the simple reason that Israel was once in the same situation. Read these words again and remember that we are citizens of a privileged nation, citizens whose ancestors were immigrants and included the orphan, the widow and the poor. "You shall not wrong or oppress a resident alien, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt. You shall not abuse any widow or orphan...If you lend money to my people, to the poor among you, you shall not deal with them as a creditor: you shall not exact interest from them."

And we are warned: "If you do abuse them, when they cry out to me, I will surely heed their cry."

Dear Padre? What is the origin of the rosary?

Could you explain what the difference is between the Catholic rosary and when the Muslims pray with their meditative beads? Did the Muslims first pray with beads and the Catholics incorporate it into the religion, but with a Christian perspective?

Dear Wondering,

Beads used to count prayers have a history older than Muslims or Christians. The Buddhists use beads to count prayers, also. The rosary and the Muslims prayer beads do not have the same purpose. The rosary is a meditation on the life of Jesus and our Blessed Mother. We use the beads to help us keep track of the number of prayers so we will know when one decade ends and another begins.

Muslim prayer beads are different. Each bead represent on of the ninety-nine known names of Allah. The one-hundredth bead represent the unknown name of Allah. The Muslims have two major prayers they use with their prayer beads. One is a prayer of praise and the other is an act of faith.

The rosary as we know it today is traced to Saint Dominic (1170-1231). The most recent addition to the rosary meditations are the luminous mysteries of Pope John Paul II.
