From the Paulpit

This week we have a number of feast days that are taking place. Two in particular have to do with angels: The feast day of the Archangels Michael, Gabriel and Raphael is celebrated on Wednesday the 29th, and Guardian Angels on Saturday the 2nd. Angels of course appear throughout the Bible, sometimes to deliver a divine message, sometimes to protect and sometimes to execute judgment. In later Christian thought, speculation on angels was influenced as much by philosophical thought as by reflection on the Bible. As a result, theories eventually arose about the hierarchy of angels. This order of the celestial hierarchy of angels was compiled in slightly different forms among various Fathers of the Church such as Ambrose, Jerome, Pope Gregory the Great, and John of Damascus, all of whom lived somewhere between the fourth and eighth centuries. But it was Dionysius the Areopagite (around 500 A.D.) who came up with what is closest to a definitive list in his "Celestial Hierarchy," where the nine choirs of celestial beings are ranked in three hierarchies, each containing three choirs. In the Middle Ages, Dionysius' speculative doctrine was further developed by the great Scholastic thinkers such as Peter Lombard, Albertus Magnus, Bonaventure, Duns Scotus and Thomas Aquinas.

The nine choirs of angels in order of rank are as follows: Seraphim, Cherubim, Thrones, Dominations, Virtues, Powers, Principalities, Archangels and Angels. The highest order, the Seraphim, are mentioned in Isaiah 6:2-7. They surround the throne of the Lord and praise Him. The Cherubim, mentioned in Genesis 3:24 and Ezekiel 28:14, function as attendants of God. The Thrones are mentioned in Colossians 1:16. According to Jewish legend there are seventy such beings. Some are numbered among the fallen angels. According to Dionysius, it is through the Thrones that God brings his justice to bear upon us.

The Dominations are also mentioned in Colossians 1:16, and according to Dionysius, they regulate angels' duties. Their emblems of authority are scepters and orbs. The Virtues' principle duty, according to Hebrew lore, is to work miracles on earth. The two angels standing by the apostles at the moment of Jesus' ascension into heaven are traditionally regarded as Virtues. The Powers are also mentioned in Colossians 1:16, and according to Dionysius, they thwart the efforts of demons to overthrow the world.

The Principalities main function, according to tradition is to protect religion. According to Dionysius, they watch over the leaders of the people and inspire them to make right decisions. However in some circles, the Principalities, along with the Powers are characterized as fallen angels, while others say that they can fall in either camp. The Archangels, or "chief angels" are, according to Dionysius, the messengers who bear divine decrees. Michael of course is referred to in the Bible (Jude 9) as the one who does battle with Satan. Gabriel of course delivers the message announcing the births of John the Baptist and Jesus. Raphael is mentioned in the Book of Tobit. There are supposedly seven Archangels whose names are: Uriel, Raguel, Michael, Seraqael, Gabriel, Haniel and Raphael. Last of all, there are the angels. They perform many functions as divine agents. They lead, protect, heal and intercede with God on behalf of humans. Guardian angels are included here in this category and do not constitute a separate choir.

While all of this information about the Celestial Hierarchy is interesting, it is also important to note that this teaching is not on the level of dogma. The important thing is to know that angels are real. The role that they have played in the Bible is real, and in many ways they continue to help us even today.

SUNDAY REFLECTION

This Week...Jesus and Amos probably would not have any trouble with people being so very rich, as long as there were not any people who were so very poor. But when the needs of the very poor are ignored or caused by the very rich, it is very troubling indeed. Because this rich man in the Gospel valued money over service, he ended up paying for his greed in the eternal fires. Paul's message for us is to remember to value God over everything, including money.

For your Reflection...This story has two characters, and only one of the characters has a name. Usually, the main character of a story — the important one — is the one named, since being known by a name signifies status. But in this story, it is the poor man who has a name: Lazarus. The rich man remains nameless.

If the story ended when these two people died, what would you think of the status of Lazarus and the status of the rich man? Who would have seemed the more significant character?

In the afterlife the rich man knows Lazarus by name. Do you think this means he might have known Lazarus by name while he was alive? If so, what kind of relationship do you think they had?

The rich man allowed Lazarus to remain by his gate. Would you feel comfortable with a homeless, diseased man living in your backyard? Was the rich man more or less tolerant and compassionate than you might be? How does that affect you?

We are a very wasteful society. Some have estimated that 50 percent or more of the food at restaurants is thrown out. Lots of hungry, homeless people could be fed with that amount of table scraps.

Do you ever waste food? Are you more likely to throw food out if you are alone or if you are with your friends? What difference does it make, either way?

Are there any opportunities for you to serve the needs of the hungry, such as in a food pantry or soup kitchen? What does your own church do for the poor and hungry? Would you like to become involved in some way?
